MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day! What thoughts come to your mind? What does the day mean to us and what do we remember? Just another "holiday"? Just a chance to take a day off from work and take the family for a ride, a picnic, with an all-day outing? Or is it an opportunity to spend the day on the golf course? What will we remember? Will we spend a few moments in silent thought and thanks for those who gave themselves that we might continue in the ways of democracy (which by the way, means a system of government that considers the individual, regardless of color, race or creed, important in the total scheme of things)? Or will we continue to thank God for our own position in life and forget that there is no such thing as a "privileged class"?

The story is told about an incident which occurred when the first Memorial Day was celebrated. A group of Washington D.C. women had asked the War Department for permission to put flowers on the soldier's graves in Arlington Cemetery. After much persuasion, permission was granted and on May 30th, the day designated, this was to be done. But a stern order was attached to the permission: No flowers were to be placed on the three hundred graves of the Confederate soldiers who were buried in a segregated section of the cemetery. The ladies who had made the request obediently decorated all the other graves, omitting the Confederate graves. Then General James A. Garfield made the speech at Arlington. When the crowd had left, a high wind rose. The wind blew almost all the flowers from the Union soldiers' graves into the Confederate area. After that day the separation was never again repeated.

PLEASE REMEMBER WHAT THIS HOLIDAY IS ALL ABOUT – It is OK to have the Family Picnic and celebrate the holiday with your friends and loved ones. But please remember what this holiday is really about. As we listen to Taps across America, take the time at 3:00 PM to say a prayer for the repose of the souls of those brave men and women who gave their lives so that you and I might live in freedom. souls and may their memory be eternal!



The Healing of the Paralytic

Christ is Risen! Today, the third Sunday after the Great and Holy Feast of Pascha, the Orthodox world commemorates the Healing of the Paralytic. We remember this event that not only transformed the life of the paralytic physically, but spiritually as he was led to a conversion and to a righteous life. Moreover, we celebrate this event as it exemplifies Jesus' divine power to give life.

As we commemorate this event detailed in the Gospel of John, does it induce a transformation similar to that of the paralytic in our lives? Granted, we may not need to be lifted from a bed where we lay physically paralyzed, but spiritually can we make such a boast that we do not need

the Lord's divine power? Are we able, a mere three weeks after His glorious Resurrection to carry His light that was passed to each of us and walk in His brilliance? My guess is that each of us, to some degree, whether we are willing to admit to ourselves or not, is

Sunday of the Paralytic

Within the 40-day period between Easter and the Ascension of our Lord are five post-Paschal Sundays. The first two of these, the Sundays of St. Thomas and the Ointment-Bearing Women, deal with events surrounding the Resurrection of Christ from the dead. However, the last three Sundays, of the Paralytic, of the Samaritan Woman and of the Man Born Blind, are events which happened at various periods during the life of Jesus Christ as recounted in the Gospel according to St. John. What are we to make of this and how did they become part of the Paschal cycle?

I have mentioned previously that the instruction of the newly baptized continued even after their baptism on Great (Holy) Saturday evening at the vigil Liturgy of the Resurrection. Their post-baptismal instruction included all the details about the Christian faith which was not revealed to unbelievers. This "disciplina arcane" (discipline of the secret) was the early Church practice of keeping the most sacred rituals and doctrines of the Church concealed from non-believers. It protected Christianity from being blasphemed, profaned and possibly even persecuted by non-Christians. Those who desired to embrace the Christian faith had these secrets revealed to them slowly as they prepared for Baptism and over a period of time even after they were baptized. Examples of the things held secret were the Our Father, the Divine Liturgy (which only baptized Christians were allowed to attend in its entirety), and the Holy Mysteries (sacraments) including Baptism. They were instructed in the full meaning of the Mystery only after being Baptized, Chrismated (Confirmed) and receiving the Eucharist. One cannot understand these Mysteries with only human reason. One had to be enlightened by the Holy Spirit through the Mysteries of Initiation (Baptism), Chrismation and Communion).

Therefore, the final three Sundays of the Paschal season involve baptismal themes which shed light on and deepened their knowledge of what they had recently undergone. This instruction began with the consideration of the Paralytic Man. Wanting to be cured of his handicap, this man waited 38 years next to the sheep's pool in Bethsaida for someone to put him into the waters after it had been stirred by an angel (Jn. 5:1-15). Christ happened upon this poor soul and healed him of his infirmity. The pool of water is seen as a prefigurement of the cleansing and healing waters of Baptism. Importantly, it was not the water stirred by an angel which cured the paralytic, but the power of Jesus Christ which enables everyone to overcome infirmities and sins.

JESUS HEALS THE PARALYTIC BY THE POOL

Great is the profit of divine Scriptures, and all sufficient is the aid which comes from them ... for the divine oracles are a treasury of all manner of medicines. Whether it be needful to quench pride, to lull passion to sleep, to tread under foot the love of money, to despise pain, to inspire confidence, to gain patience - in the Scriptures we may find abundant resource. For what man of those who struggle with long poverty or who are nailed by a grievous disease will not, when he reads the passage before us, receive much comfort? Since this man had been a paralytic for thirty eight years, and he saw others delivered each year, and himself bound by his disease, not even so did he fall back and despair, though in truth not merely despondency for the past, but also hopelessness for the future was sufficient to overstrain him ... Yes, Lord, he says, but I have no man ... to put me in the pool. What can be more pitiable than these words? ... Do you see a heart crushed through long sickness? Do you see all violence subdued? ... He did not curse his day ... but replied gently ... Yes, Lord; yet he did not know who it was who asked him.

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ourselves or not, is waiting for the water to be stirred in our life that brings about that healing of body and soul and sets us on a righteous path.

The water though has already been stirred! Let us not forget that at our baptism we were baptized into Christ through our immersion into the water of the font. We were freed from the paralysis of sin and given life in Christ. Similarly, then, we should **TODAY** celebrate our spiritual transformation along with the paralytic and as Jesus said, "sin no more".

Let us meditate on the Propers from the Sunday of the Paralytic and the Feast of St. George which we celebrate this Thursday:

Sunday of the Paralytic

O ineffable goodness Who created the human form * You came to heal those who are ill. * O Christ by Your word You raised the Paralytic at the Sheep Poll * You healed the suffering of the woman with the flow of blood * You showed mercy to the tormented daughter of the Canaanite woman * and You did not disdain the prayer of the Centurion. Because of this we cry out in praise: * O Almighty Lord, glory to You!

Jesus went up to Jerusalem to the Sheep Pool * which in Hebrew was called Bethesda * And there lay a great multitude of sick people in its five porticoes * for the angel of the Lord went down at certain times and stirred the waters * granting healing to those who approached in faith. * The Lord saw there a man with a chronic illness * and He asked him: Do you want to be healed? * The sick man replied: * I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred. * I have spent my money on physicians * and received no help from anyone. * The Physician of soul and body said to him: * Take up your pallet and walk * proclaim to the whole world * the greatness of My mercy and My mighty

ou may wonder why the miracles of healing and raising from the dead, contained in this Sunday's Epistle, are read during this Resurrection season. The Fathers of the Church point out that in such wonders of restoration, we have a foreshadowing of our own resurrection from the grave.

The lesson from the Acts of the Apostles tells of **TWO** incidents. In the first, Peter the Apostle came to Lydda and there found a paralytic who had been kept to his bed for eight years. Peter said to Aeneas: "Jesus Christ heals you! Get up and take up your bed." Sure enough, Aeneas was restored to health and did as commanded.

The 2nd incident is even more glorious. A short distance from Lydda was the village of Joppa, and here lived a pious and charitable woman, Dorcas. She fell ill and died. The Christians washed her body and laid it in the upper room, apparently their place of worship. Having heard that Peter was nearby, they summoned him.

When Peter arrived, the village folk were in tears. The widows and poor showed him the clothes that Dorcas had sewn and given them. The apostle went to the upper room, knelt down in prayer, felt the power and inspiration of the Spirit, and then spoke to the dead woman: "Tabitha, rise!" She opened her eyes and sat up. One can only imagine the wonder created by this act.

As these miracles prove, there is **HOPE** in our troubled world. Our faith in Christ has the power to restore, to raise up, to resurrect. As we submit ourselves to Him, as we obey Him, we come into contact with this power of the Lord.
