FEAST O THE ASCENSION



Ascension is a feast which should raise us up above the smallness land the narrowness of earthly cares. Christ has made our Ascension possible, too. We will one day, please God, be lifted up away from all the troubles and the annoyances that seem so overpowering and so numerous now.

Imagine for a moment the thoughts of our divine Lord as He rose slowly from the Mount of Olives: He could see Bethlehem where no one had welcomed Him when He was born, Nazareth where He had lived a life of poverty and hardships for thirty years, Jerusalem where He bad been reviled and tortured

and crucified.

Having triumphed, and won the day, how did these scenes of His sufferings appear to Him now? Our day will come, too, when we can look down with joy on the battlefields of life where we were sore-tried and wounded, but persevered through God's grace, and won. How small will our effort seem then, compared with the greatness of the reward! How short-lived our battles, compared with the eternity of the heavenly peace we have won!

The Apostles returned from the Mount of Olives not with heavy hearts, but with souls full of confidence and trust. There was work to be done for the Master and for souls. That work would take them they knew not where, that apostate would bring on them they cared not what, their lives were now in their Master's hands. How well-placed their confidence was subsequent history proves; their names are inscribed forever in the Book of Life.

YOU AND I can also return from the Mount of Olives today with a greater confidence and a surer trust in our loving Savior. He has gone, as He Himself said, to prepare a place for us. He has asked us to carry on, for a short while more, with the task He has given us to do here.

He will be back, sooner than we realize, and if He finds us struggling on, doing nothing world-shaking, but putting our heart and soul into the trivial daily tasks, we will hear not the voice of the stern Judge, but the welcome call of the beloved Shepherd: "Come ye blessed of my Father, take possession of the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."

BLINDNESS TAKES MANY FORMS

Helen Keller, who became a famous author and lecturer despite being born deaf and blind, was once asked if she thought that there was anything worse than not having her sight. "Only one thing is worse than blindness," she replied, "and that is to have eyes and not see!" The truth of Helen Keller's words are painfully obvious in this morning's Gospel lesson. Christ encounters a man who has been blind from birth. Because of his handicap, the blind man is somewhat of an outcast. Even the Apostles question their Master, "Who sinned that this man should have been born blind?"

What is the reaction to Christ's miracle of giving sight to the blind man? Some of his neighbors express doubt that he is really the same person they knew as sightless. The Pharisees question him as they would a common criminal. The man's own parents distance themselves from him, refusing to get involved in the controversy. The eyes of everyone were blinded to the fact that the Lord had chosen the unfortunate man to be a means of showing His power.

Sadly, many of us who proclaim ourselves to be "Christians" do not see Jesus as being the **LIGHT OF THE WORLD**, stubbornly remaining mired in the darkness of our sins. May the words of the Kondakion for this Sunday remind us of our need to be illumined by our Savior: "I come to You, O Christ, like the man born blind from birth, and I cry to You with repentance: You are a radiant and glorious light to those who stumble in darkness."

ASCENSION is Christ's "Moving Day" HEAVEN our eternal home

When our Lord ascended into heaven, He took no worldly thing with Him. This is another instance in which He was as we are: we shall, when we die and leave the world, take not a single worldly thing with us. If we haven't sent our "riches" on ahead of time, we shall have nothing.

The Bible tells us that we are born into the world naked, and so shall we leave it. We may accumulate worldly things during our short stay here, but we shall shed them all when we leave have often thought of Ascension Thursday as "moving day". Our Lord moved out of the hut (as it were) of the world into His palace in heaven. He moved easily and joyfully because He was unencumbered by worldly obstacles.

The day of our moving will be a most important one. Our eternal home depends

We too will have to move from the world into eternity. We don't know when, but we are positive the day will come. It may be soon or it may be a little later. But, we

THE ASCENSION OF JESUS AND OUR SPIRITUAL LIFE After the Resurrection, Jesus did not come back to live among us as before. He

now returned to the glory He had with the Father. This is especially evident in the Gospel of St. John where Jesus tells His disciples before His arrest, "I came from the Father and have come into the world. Now I am leaving the world and going back to the Father" (John 16:28). "Father, the hour has come. Give glory to Your Son, so that Your Son may glorify You" (John 17:1). Jesus is truly and physically risen, but He did not return to life in this world as did Lazarus, the son of the widow of Nain and the daughter of Jairus.

Jesus' last words are "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to Me... I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Matt. 28:18). Jesus did not return to live among us, but He is with us in power and Spirit. In the Gospel of John, the first action of the risen Jesus when He appears to His disciples is to give them the gift of the Holy Spirit (John 20:19-23). In the Gospel of Mark, "the Lord Jesus, offer He speke with them (the disciples) was taken into heaven a taken into heaven a taken into heaven and the His sout at

Each of the Gospel writers expresses this mystery in a different way. In Matthew,

after He spoke with them (the disciples) was taken into heaven & took His seat at the right hand of God" (Mark 16:19). Jesus is alone the true high priest whose

role is to mediate between God & His people & to bring salvation. Those who function as priests on earth only do so in the power of the Holy Spirit, the gift of Jesus to His Church. The Epistle to the Hebrews echoes what Mark says, "we have such a high priest, who has taken His seat at the right hand of the throne of the majesty in heaven, a minister of the sanctuary & of the true tabernacle that the Lord, not man, set up" (Hebrews 8:1-2). St. Luke alone tells us that Jesus ascended on the 40th day (Acts 1:3) & describes the Ascension as Jesus being "taken up" (Luke 24:51) & "lifted up", disappearing into a cloud (Acts 1:9). As He was taken up, He was blessing His followers, a priestly action that He now performs from the right hand of the heavenly Father.

Because St. Luke says that the Ascension took place on the 40th day, this day has been kept by the Church to celebrate the glorification of Jesus, our Lord and Savior. Just as the life of the earthly Jesus was transformed by glory, so also the lives of those who believe in Him are transformed by the Resurrection. Before the Resurrection, Jesus had a mission to the people of Israel. When a Canaanite woman - a foreigner - asked Christ to cure her daughter, He replied, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel" (Matt. 15:24). After the Resurrection, our Lord tells His followers: "Go ... and make disciples of all nations" (Matt. 28:19). St. Paul stated about 25 years later: "A;; of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free man, there is not male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:27-28). The Gospel of the Risen Christ is for all people, without distinction of race, gender or status.

The great feasts of the Church year recall the mighty deeds that God has done on our behalf. For these deeds we return to Him glory and praise. However, the feasts are not only a historical commemoration of what happened in the past, but also tell us about our life of the Spirit today. By the love that Christ showed on the Cross and by His 3rd day Resurrection, the faithful who believe in Him are also transformed by love and are filled with life. This happens in the Mystery of Baptism ("you are clothed with Christ") which is renewed every time that we receive the Mystery of the Eucharist: the Body and Blood of Christ, Himself. On the Feast of the Ascension, we sing: "Ascending in glory today from the Mount of Olives, through Your great love, You lifted up our fallen nature and enthroned it with the Father on high... Therefore, serve Him in justice and holiness."

The spiritual life is not a private and lonely journey. The kingdom of God will be the restoration of Paradise. It will come about only when we will be able to treat everyone equally, without distinction of race or ethnicity or status or gender. God has created every human being and loves every person equally. He wishes all to come to salvation, and if we are to find Him in our own lives, and if we are to be united with Him, then we too must be at the service of our neighbor. We must see in every person a fellow traveler on the road to unity with God. Our Lord has told us that we serve Him when we show kindness to each other, for "whatever you do for one of these least brothers of Mine, you do it for ME!" (Matt. 25:40).

WHY GO TO CHURCH?

A Churchgoer wrote a letter to the editor of the newspaper and complained that it made no sense to go to church every Sunday. "I've gone for 30 years now," he wrote, "and in that time I have heard something like 3,000 sermons. But for the life of me, I can't remember a single one of them. So I think I'm wasting my time and the priests are wasting theirs by giving sermons at all." This started a real controversy in the "Letters to the Editor" column, much to the delight of the editor. It went on for weeks until someone wrote this clincher: "I've been married for 30 years now. In that time my wife has cooked some 32,000 meals. But for the life of me, I cannot recall the entire menu for a single one of those meals. But I do know this: They all nourished me and gave me the strength I needed to do my work. If my wife had not given me those meals, I would be physically dead today. Likewise, if I had not gone to church for nourishment, I would be spiritually dead today!"
